5	Boys, girls and families	 Talk about the similarities and differences between the males and females. Begin to play inclusively with their friends, regardless of their sex (if not already doing so.) Think differently and more openly about what a family may look like. 	Share a Circle Time together and discuss whether boys and girls are different. Discuss whether boys and girls like the same things. Do they look the same? How are they different? Do you have friends that are the same as you? How are we different? Naturally ask if boys and girls have the same bodies and discuss what children know. Use correct terminology to explain differences. If differences in private body parts arise, then name them and discuss keeping them private: Who can see these parts? Who can we show them to? How do we keep them private? How can we keep them clean?
